3 choices: 1) do nothing and hope that this is an isolated incident and that it does not escalate; 2) deal with it as part of the dissolution to limit contact; or 3) obtain a stalking order. The stalking order has the benefit of being filed with the police and they usually are pretty good about enforcing it if some incident occurs where the police catch [REDACTED] in violation. But [REDACTED] tactics usually are similar to what happened last night which means that it is enforced by you going to court and testifying about the incident and where of course [REDACTED] will deny it. Your best options are 1 and 3. The downside of #3 is that it costs money to get the order and it may cost more money to enforce it. I can carve out time tomorrow to talk.

Here is exactly what happened.

At approximately 6:40, after our call, I left our house to drive to pick up [REDACTED]. As I was driving up Twin Fir about 2 blocks from our house a [REDACTED] SUV swerved in front of me into a vacant house driveway. I had to break quickly to avoid hitting the car or run off the road -- which is sort of steep at that point. I was immediately very shaken up. So stayed parked a second. I looked over at the driveway and saw that it was [REDACTED] in the [REDACTED] with the dealer tags still on the car. I stayed stopped a couple more seconds. I drove forward a little bit and [REDACTED] backed up and drove off, turning up another street. I continued on to the school.

After I picked up [REDACTED], I drove back the same route. The address of the house was 15200 Twin Fir.

I was very shaken up. [REDACTED] asked what happened. I told him I had a close call with a car and left it at that.
